English

Reading - I can see that some of you have been having a go at the books that have been allocated to you on Bug Club, so well done and keep that up! There are some great books on there!

Writing & Grammar - I still like some of the stuff in the home learning packs produced by Hamilton trust and thought you might like to have a go at some of the activities. The links to them are on our Year 4 home learning page but if you Google - Hamilton Trust home learning it will open the page with the links to the packs. This week (English, Year 4, Week 3) looks at adverbials, using them in a short story and noun phrases in poetry.

Maths

Keep using Times Table Rock Stars to practise the times tables. Remember, we need to know them all. Also have a go at the maths games on Purple Mash if you can.

For this week's maths I'd like you to practise some of the maths that we have learned this year, so I've put some addition and some long multiplication on there. It would also be a good time to practise telling the time - maybe you could get your family members involved. This week I'd like you to find out some time facts - it's important that you know and remember these as they will always be useful to you. If you need help, ask someone or find out online.

PE - there are lots of links to physical activities in the 'Physical Activity Programme' on the home learning section of the school website.

Science

As Spring has definitely started to arrive, it would be a good time to note what changes it is bringing with it. Make some notes in your green book about what changes you notice now that spring is in the air. Really observe what's going on outdoors, in your garden and in the local area when you maybe out for a walk. How does it look/ feel different to the winter months?

Art

Staying with the theme of the arrival of spring, you could do some observational drawing. Perhaps you could sit in your garden and sketch something, maybe a tree in blossom or a visiting bird or anything else that signals the arrival of spring. Just sit in the sunshine and see what you can see. Remember - art is personal to the artist and there is no right way or wrong way of creating it.
