Eg: **Before** you put that hat on, throw it up in the air. **After** you have eaten those crisps, put the packet on your head

Give your mum a cuddle first, **next** blow a raspberry on her cheek (hehe).

Yesterday I had strawberries for my snack. Today I am going to play with my lego. Tomorrow I am going for a walk.

Have a think about the different ways that you can move from one place to another. How many can you do on one walk? Can you skip, side step, tiptoe, stomp? I bet you can think of even better ways.

This week in English you are going to think about the ways you can describe something using adjectives. There are two to dos set on purple mash to help you with this. One way to write a great description is to think of words to describe how something... Sounds-

Smells-

Tastes-

Feels-

Looks-

(sometimes it is better just to pick a couple of these– I don't want to taste a bed if I am describing that!)

Can you find something in your house and describe it using your senses? It might be a paragraph like this...

My bed is <u>smooth</u> and <u>straight</u> and it smells <u>clean</u> and <u>fresh</u> like soap and washing powder. It is <u>soft</u> and <u>white</u> with <u>green spots</u> on it.

I used smell, touch and looks to describe a bed. What senses will you use and what will you describe? Write down your words first and get someone to help you with the spellings.

Remember...

- Sound out every word using your phonics.
- Start each sentence with a capital letter and end with a full stop.
- Use finger spaces.
- Use a conjunction like... And, because, but, so.
- Use your best writing. Start on the line and walk in and out of your letters.
